REFLECTION: NO MATTER HOW BUSY THE TERM GETS, LET THE LORD SPEAK!

My dear friends.

A warm welcome back to Cambridge to those of you who have been away, and to everyone, greetings and all good wishes at the beginning of a new Term. Easter Term in Cambridge has its own character, which many more people than usual will be experiencing in all its fullness for the first time this year. Perhaps for most, it will be a time of shifting emotions, with an intensity that can sometimes be disturbing: anxiety juxtaposed with festivity; nervousness about exams or submission deadlines. alternating with the anticipation of celebrations to come when it is all over. And, of course, especially for those for whom this is their final term in Cambridge, there is the ambivalence that, one way or another, pretty much inevitably accompanies the ending of chapters in all of our lives: the complex mix of gratitude and regret as we look backwards, and of excitement and trepidation as we look forwards.

Perhaps the coincidence between Easter Term and Eastertide has something to tell us here too. In the weeks between the first Easter and the first Pentecost, the friends of Jesus had to negotiate the landscape of memories, joyful and sorrowful, newly illuminated by the glory of the Resurrection. The gospels tell us how, in their encounters with the risen Lord, the apostles are invited to revisit the events that led to his death and see them anew – and thus see themselves anew in relation to Jesus. Peter, for instance, who denied Christ three times by the midnight brazier in the high priest's courtyard on that terrible night of the Lord's arrest, is affirmed three times by Christ at another charcoal fire at dawn, as

the Lord entrusts him with feeding his flock. Neither the abject horror of his betrayal, nor the bravado that preceded it, and that must have seemed so bitterly ludicrous in its light – "even if I have to die with you, I will never deny you" – has the last word. The last word belongs to Jesus, and to his creative, recreative love for Peter, transfiguring his shame into acceptance – rekindling, surely, his gratitude for all that journeying with Jesus has meant to him already, and opening up the possibility of new growth in his friendship with the Lord.

It's also striking that Peter receives this invitation — an invitation that is simultaneously his healing and his vocation; the reassurance of Jesus' tender compassion for him and the call to minister that compassion to others — in the stillness of dawn, on the disciples' return from a night-time fishing expedition, while the rest of the world sleeps on. It's a reminder, perhaps, of the importance of allowing the Lord an opportunity to speak similar words of healing and vocation to us, in those moments when we, too, can withdraw a little from the clamour of the preoccupations that sometimes threaten to overwhelm us amid a relentlessly noisy world.

But such moments are, of course, hard to come by, especially in Easter Term. There are two things that must be said. On the one hand, as all the great spiritual masters and mistresses of our tradition insist, it is immensely helpful for us to set aside specific times for prayer – so that alongside all the other dates in our crowded calendars, we schedule regular appointments with God. Such habits of prayer will doubtless make us the more alert to

those moments that are sometimes given us unexpectedly: the chance-meetings as we go about our daily business, as the risen Christ appeared to the disciples as they re-entered the workaday world of steering boats and hauling nets. But secondly, sometimes it is precisely in the unforeseen and unforeseeable interruption of our daily busyness perhaps because of a bout of sickness, for instance – that we may be most conscious of the Lord alongside us, inviting himself, so to speak, to an appointment we have not planned. This too is important because it reminds us that we are not, finally, in control of our agendas: that's the Lord's job, and he discharges it with infinite strength, but also with infinite kindness. We do not need to be afraid that he will abandon us because in our weakness and limitations we sometimes abandon him, any more than Peter's denial was met with denial in return. It is sometimes when we can no longer maintain the illusion that it is we who are in command of the situation that we may be most ready to hear this most consoling of messages.

As Easter term gets underway, let's look out, and help one another to look out, for those quiet ways in which the risen Lord longs to draw close to each one of us, sustaining us in our work, refreshing us in our rest, blessing us with his forgiveness and healing, and going before us into a future we cannot yet imagine.

ELIZABETH KOLB MEMORIAL TRUST: APPLICATIONS OPEN!

The Elizabeth Kolb Memorial Trust offers grants to Catholic women students at the University of Cambridge who were born in the United Kingdom or the Republic of Ireland. Eligible women may apply for grants towards the cost of books or equipment, travel (particularly if related to their studies) or medical expenses.
